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Lesson 1

A Heart Attack

Genesis 3

Adam and Eve are vulnerable and Satan is vile.

Summary

The Bible establishes in the record of the fall in Genesis 3, where the real battle to obey God is located. There will be external temptations. They will be presented through the body (eyes, ears, etc.). They will come into the heart, the inner man, where beliefs and wants flow in words. Out of the words of the heart, the Word of God is believed or denied resulting in sin.

Physical weakness and vulnerability are special times of testing and temptation for our good.

Complaining is both a \underline{sin} and a $\underline{symptom}$.

There is neither $\underline{t\ a\ s\ k}$ nor $\underline{t\ r\ i\ a\ l}$ too great for us to bear; God has made provision for them both.

Our great and merciful High Priest has been <u>tempted</u> just as we are and is able to come to our aid.

Summary about Heart Idols:

Heart idols are the \underline{false} gods we erect in our hearts in competition with the true and living God.

We choose to obey them and trust them to bring us the <u>blessings</u> we want

In turn, they rule and drive us. We are both willful choosers and helpless $\underline{s \mid a \lor e \: s}$ to our idols.

"The fallen human heart cannot see beauty in holiness, but finds pleasure in that which ultimately brings ruin." (Thomas E. McComiskey, Hosea, on Hosea 11:5)

The Heart in the New Covenant

Out of the heart come all sins as the overflow of the heart.

Summary

Using our communication, talk and words as the primary example, Jesus highlights the inner man, the heart, as the root source and sole cause of all actions and emotions. Thus, true Biblical change takes place through heart change as provided by the work of the cross and our identity as New Covenant believers.

Visual Models to Clarify Truths

The good steward out of his storehouse breaks forth treasures, both old and new

Summary

Using the example of Jesus' use of illustration to clarify truths and to limit understanding of truths to the spiritually enabled, we develop and use visual models to represent complex Biblical and spiritual realities.

Thinking about Illustrations

It is important to take a few minutes to understand the purposes, strengths and weaknesses of models.

Illustrations are intended to picture, not be the reality.


Illustrations are intended to illustrate, not prove.

Illustrations can only $\underline{s} \, \underline{h} \, \underline{o} \, \underline{w}$ one or two facets of a truth.

Illustrations are used by Jesus to <u>clarify</u> truths.

Illustrations are used by Jesus to \underline{h} i \underline{d} \underline{e} truths from all but those who are spiritually enabled to see.







Heart Circumcision

Colossians 2:6-3:4

As you received Christ Jesus the Lord, so walk in him, rooted and built up in him and established in the faith, just as you were taught, abounding in thanksgiving.

Summary

Being placed into Christ, our inner man, our heart, has been circumcised from the flesh by the Holy Spirit's application of the death and resurrection so that our spiritual inner life is from Christ in heaven on whom we set the gaze of our hearts by faith.

Deadly Errors in Transformation

The following table observes what Paul is engaged with as error faced by the church.

Several basic errors have always been embraced by God's people, both under the Old and New Covenants with disastrous affects for growth and change, for transformation, for practical heart and behavior holiness. The following table extracts the data from the text. We will explain more as we follow the argument of the text in the rest of the lesson.

Answering the Errors

Verses	Myth	Truth
8-10	Gnosticism Christ is less than God and not truly human because the flesh, the body is inherently evil so we must transcend the body to be holy.	Christ, as fully human, is God in the flesh in a human body uncorrupted by sin in Himself or His body.
11-17	Legalism One must live by the rules and regulations of the Old Covenant to be holy under the New Covenant.	The work of the cross grants forgiveness, pays the debt and cuts us free from sin and the Old Covenant leaving us liberty in righteousness
18-19	Mysticism One can only be holy by direct access to God through personal revelations by angelic visitations or visions.	Holiness is a result of being in Christ, the head of the body and holding fast to Christ and our identity in Him.
20-23	Asceticism One can be only holy by denying and abusing the body because it is inherently evil.	We live outwardly holy because we have been crucified with Christ so that we live in the body but are not its slaves, but its masters.

Analyzing the Errors

Notice that every myth makes the following theological error.

The body/world/flesh is inherently <u>e v i l</u>.

The body is the <u>source</u> of my sin and ungodliness.

What Christ has done for us may be <u>s u f f i c i e n t</u> for our redemption, but not for our transformation.

The errors are focused on the external.

The errors deny the centrality of Christ for our personal and practical holiness.

The Importance of Christ's Centrality

(v.1-7)

Paul highlights the centrality of Christ for the Christian life and walk.

In His Concern

To \underline{resist} false teaching and intellectual persuasion (v.4)

To $\underline{c} \circ \underline{m} \circ \underline{m} \circ \underline{n} \circ \underline{d}$ them for holding the line (v.5)

In His Command

(v.6-8)

To walk by faith

(v. 6-7)

To be on the <u>g u a r d</u>

(v. 8)

The wisdom of God in Christ stands as the Christians treasure, teaching and transforming wisdom. We turn away to the seductive and persuasive systems of human wisdom to our ruin. We will be despoiled of that which is our only hope and help, that we believe, trust, embrace and walk in Christ.

The Instruction in Christ's Centrality

(v.9-15)

Our <u>Fullness</u> in Christ

(v.9-10)

All of <u>G o d</u> is in Christ bodily

All believers are indwelt by God in Christ

Our Circumcision in Christ

(v.11-12)

Its Spiritual <u>Effect</u>

(v.11)

Before our conversion, our outer man and our inner man were intertwined so that we were sinful in our persons and in our deeds.

When we were saved, the Holy Spirit "circumcised" us; that is, He cut our inner man, our heart away from the flesh/world/old man/the outer man.

Its Spiritual <u>C a u s e</u>

(v.12)

This circumcision is caused by our union with Christ by the Holy Spirit into the death and resurrection of Christ.

Our Resurrection in Christ

(v.13-15)

(v.16-3:3)

Granted us new life raising us out of spiritual deadness.

Forgiven of our trespasses freeing us from guilt.

Canceled the debt incurred by the legal demands of the Law.

Disarmed spiritual enemies empowering victory over them.

The <u>Imperatives</u> from Christ's Centrality

Do not try to live by the <u>Old Covenant</u>. (v.16-19)

Do not allow others to $\underline{i} u d \underline{g} e you$ (v.16-17)

Do not allow others to <u>disqualify</u> you (v.18-19)

We must hold fast to Christ from whom all of us receive our nourishment and strength (v.19).

Do not try to live by <u>human regulations</u>. (v.20-23)

Rules living is from the world to which you have <u>d i e d</u>.

Rules living is <u>u s e l e s s</u> against the indulgences of the flesh.

Do live by faith in the truths of the $g \circ s p \in I$. (3:1-4)

<u>Seek</u> things above where Christ is (v.1)

<u>Set</u> your minds on things above (v.2-3)

Patiently <u>persevere</u> until Christ comes (v.4)

Lessons for Living

Recognize the common <u>s u b s t i t u t e s</u> for Biblical Christian living.

Affirm that these common substitutes are \underline{NOT} viable alternatives and are dangerous to our souls.

Seek to live the Christian life by <u>faith</u>, believing all that the Scriptures tells us is true of Christ and of us in our union to Him.

Your inner man, your heart, has been cut free from the flesh, the world, through your union with Christ and your being placed into His death and resurrection.

You must respond to these truths through all the imperatives Paul writes – we are actively responding to these truths.

Questions for Discussion

What is heart circumcision?
What does it mean?
What 3 commandments does Paul give since Christ is central and our hearts are circumcised?

Freed from Sin's Enslaving Power

Romans 6

But thanks be to God, that you who were once slaves of sin have become obedient from the heart to the standard of teaching to which you were committed, and, having been set free from sin, have become slaves of righteousness.

Summary

These truths are absolutely essential for people who have a right standing with God –to please and glorify God in every aspect of life – that is, they are growing in grace. The gospel with its saving and sanctifying power causes us by faith to have hope while living in a fallen world. It tells us how, though we are in the presence of sin, we are not subject to its power.

Here are the questions that plague us and are answered here:

CAN I continue to sin since we are under grace?

MUST I continue to sin since we are under grace?

Here is the $\underline{incongruity}$, but not the $\underline{impossibility}$ of ongoing sin.

Issue 1 - Do we continue in sin?

Key motif - death and life

Characteristics - What is true of us (v.1-11)

Its <u>Initiation</u> - How it Begins

(v.1-3)

Its Instruction - What it Means

(v.4-9)

You were born *in Adam*. You were in the realm or sphere of sin and darkness, occasionally called the flesh. In that realm you had what is called the old self, the person you were as spiritually dead and training yourself in habits of sin. Then, when you were converted/saved, God placed you *in Christ*. You were transferred into the Christ's kingdom and spiritually united to His body through the Spirit. These are the invisible (and admittedly, difficult) spiritual reality. When you were placed into Christ and united to Him, you were joined to His death and resurrection.

You have physical life here on earth experienced in your body and through your five senses.

You have spiritual life in the heavenlies and that spiritual life is hidden in Christ and will be unveiled when He comes.

You have been separated through the cross from the old person that you were, the old self.

You have a physical body that is living in the presence of sin.

The point and purpose is that we may $\underline{w \ a \ l \ k}$ in newness of life and not be $\underline{e \ n \ s \ l \ a \ v \ e \ d}$ to sin.

Its <u>Implementation</u> - How it Acts

(v.10-11)

These verses then call for us to $\underline{c \circ n s i d e r}$ carefully these truths about Christ (v.10) and then $c \circ u n t$ them to be true for us (v.11).

You have to know that you have been placed into Christ.

You have to know what Christ's death and resurrection mean.

You have to know how being placed into Christ and thus His death and resurrection applies to you.

Commands - What is required of us

Don't Allow Sin to Reign

Do not allow sin to rule you through lusts.

Don't Make Yourself Available to Sin

Don't let sin master you because sin will not master you.

Don't Because You are Under Grace, not Law

(v.14)

Issue 2 - Must we continue to sin?

Key motif - master and slave

Problem - free from law means free to sin?

(v.15)

Those under law are under the dominion of sin.

Those under grace are not under the dominion of sin.

Presentation - who we yield to rules us (v.16-19) Product - what it creates in our lives

(v.20-23)

Lessons for Living

We have true $\underline{u n i o n}$ with Christ by being placed in Christ.

We may not live as though sin does not matter.

We may not live as though sin has <u>control</u>.

We have been <u>delivered</u> from the old life and are <u>empowered</u> for the new life (v.4-11).

We have been delivered from the condemnation of the law to the freedom and power of <u>a r a c e</u> (v.14ff).

We must not <u>let</u> sin master us because sin <u>is not going</u> to master us (v.13-14).

We must $\underline{o} \underline{b} \underline{e} \underline{v}$ from the $\underline{h} \underline{e} \underline{a} \underline{r} \underline{t}$, having been freed from sin and become God's slaves (v.17-18).

We must <u>present</u> ourselves to God for His use, rather than presenting ourselves to sin for its use.

We must understand that we may not live as though sin were not <u>deadly</u> and transformation were not <u>demanded</u>.

Discussion Questions

Released from Law's Ineffective Realm

Romans 7

Oh, what a miserable person I am! Who will free me from this life that is dominated by sin and death? Thank God! The answer is in Jesus Christ our Lord.

Summary

The summary of the argument is laid out (v.5-6). Notice how each of the phrases corresponds to Romans 6 - 8.

For while we were living in the flesh, our sinful passions, aroused by the law, were at work in our members to bear fruit for death.

= Romans 6

But now we are released from the law, having died to that which held us captive, so that we serve not under the old written code

= Romans 7

but in the new life of the Spirit

= Romans 8

Our <u>Freedom</u> from the Law

(v.1-6)

The Law is treated as a sphere of authority and power which we have been delivered from.

Its Clarifying Illustration

(v.1-3)

Paul poses a question based on a <u>legal</u> principle.

This is a carefully crafted illustration.

Its Careful <u>Instruction</u>

(v.4-6)

Upon the death of another, the Lord Jesus Christ, we have been released from the authority sphere of the Law.

Our release from the Law is a redemptive-historical reality that impacts us personally and individually.

This perspective prepares us to expect an $\underline{i n a u g u r a t e d}$ and $\underline{i n c o m p l e t e}$ experience of its reality.

The Functioning of the Law

(v.7-13)

Verses 7-12 argue that though the Law is holy and its content just and good, it is bent by the power of sin to arouse wants and passions leading to evil deeds resulting in the judgment of death.

In its Purpose

(v.7)

To show us what sin is...

In its <u>Powerlessness</u>

(v.8-11)

Sin uses the law to stir up evil $\underline{d e s i r e s}$ and $\underline{d e e d s}$ resulting in the judgment of death

Paul clearly sees sin as an <u>a c t i v e f o r c e</u>, a power whose affects can be felt and described.

So, verses 8-11 describe the e n e r g i z i n g power of sin in the presence of people trying to live by law.

In its <u>Perfection</u>

(v.12)

 \underline{Sin} is the problem, not the law.

We are released from the Law, not because it is sinful, wrong or evil, but because it only $\underline{r e v e a l s}$, not $\underline{s o l v e s}$ our sinfulness.

Our Futility under the Law

(v.13-25)

In its \underline{Cause} (v.13)

What is the cause of our futility under the Law?

We know how \underline{b} a \underline{d} sin is because it is so perverted and so powerful that it \underline{u} s \underline{e} s \underline{b} the Law the way it does.

With its **Conflict**

(v.14-20)

The conflict is the great conflict between that which is $\underline{spiritual}$ and that which is \underline{flesh} .

We are decisively delivered from the $\underline{p \circ w e r}$ of sin while we live in the $\underline{p r e s e n c e}$ of fallenness.

Notice the repetition of the word "do".

Notice also the repetition of the word "want".

Paul is not saying that since this is our $\underline{struggle}$ we are then no longer $\underline{responsible}$.

In its <u>Consequence</u>

(v.21-25)

He observes the presence of conflicting $\underline{spheres}$ of authority and law (v.21-23.

He observes the terrible $\underline{s} t \underline{a} t \underline{e}$ we are in if we try to live by the Law (v.24)

He responds by pointing us to Jesus Christ, our Lord (v.25).

Lessons for Living

Not <u>license</u> and not <u>law</u>, but <u>life</u> by the Spirit

Hughes' 4 Pillars of Romans 7- (Kent Hughes, Romans)

First Pillar: Our marriage to the Law has been broken by our death and resurrection in Christ. The Law has no more power over us.

Second Pillar: The Law is good, for it reveals to us the righteous demands of God. It reveals the utter pervasiveness of sin. To the believer this is grace.

Third Pillar: When a believer tries to live a life that is pleasing to God in his own strength, he will fail every time.

Fourth Pillar: That very failure makes him ready for God's grace.

God has granted us victory over sin but we are groaning in <u>struggle</u> and <u>suffering</u> until the day Jesus comes.

Freed to Walk in the Spirit as Sons

Romans 8

Every person who belongs to Christ has been transferred into this new domain in which the Spirit rather than the flesh rules. The present possession of life by the Spirit will lead to the enjoyment of physical life through the resurrection of the body. This will be accomplished through the power of the Spirit, who now indwells us and empowers us through trial, trouble and suffering. (Adapted from D.A. Carson)

Summary

"There is no reason why those who are in Christ Jesus should go on doing penal servitude as though they had never been pardoned and liberated from the prison house of sin." (F.F. Bruce) Romans 8 shows us how we live in the freedom and power of God's Spirit while yet groaning and suffering. While we walk in the Spirit, we do so in the world until the Lord comes.

The <u>Service</u> of God's Spirit

(v.1-17)

Godly living begins with the truth that there is no condemnation for us (v.1) and ends with our personal testimony that there is no one to condemn us (v.34).

To Change us by God's Righteousness

(v.1-8)

Because of Spiritual Truths (v.1-4).

Through $\underline{Changed} \underline{Mindset}(v.5-8)$.

Here is the primary function of the Spirit in practical terms of changing us: He gives us a new mindset that transforms us. Notice, those who mind the flesh, live according to the flesh, are hostile to God, do not and cannot submit to God's law, do not please God and all this is death, God's judgment.

James Luther Mays, *Harper's Bible Commentary* (San Francisco: Harper & Row, 1996, c1988).

To Indwell us as God's Life

(v.9-13)

The present possession of spiritual life in dying and mortal bodies anticipates the possession of spiritual life in a living and glorified body at the resurrection.

"Here we are called by faithfulness to the Scriptures to hold in tension two clear truths: that the indwelling of the Spirit infallibly secures eternal life, and that a lifestyle empowered by and patterned after God's Spirit is necessary to inherit eternal life. The Spirit is given to empower our activity in righteousness." (Carson, *NBC*).

To Assure us as God's Sons

(v.14-17)

His work affecting us in the present.

His work aiming us toward the future.

The <u>Struggle</u> of God's Children

(v.18-30)

We are now experiencing present suffering while longing for a future glory. What we have here is groaning and glory. There is groaning and glory for creation, in the Christian, by the Spirit for our good and God's glory.

Its Example in the Creation

(v.18-22)

The creation is now subject to the curse because of the fallenness of man.

Its Experience in Ourselves

(v.23-25)

We share in creation's groaning and hope.

Most errors concerning the <u>victorious</u> or the <u>victimized</u> Christian life flow from not understanding verses 23-25. You are delivered, but not yet. You are adopted, but not yet. You have the Spirit, but not fully. You groan now in suffering and struggling because there is a splendor of glory to come.

Its $E \times p \cdot r \cdot e \cdot s \cdot s \cdot i \cdot o \cdot n$ by the Spirit

(v.26-27)

Its Expectation due to God

(v.28-30)

In the midst of groaning, in the midst of struggling with sin while walking in the Spirit, we know that God is at work in all our situations to transform and conform us into the likeness of Christ.

We lean towards the glory to come in the present experience of groaning now because God is at work to mold us to be like Christ.

The <u>Surety</u> of God's Love

(v.31-39)

We are now inseparable from God's love while experiencing no condemnation and becoming more than conquerors.

In our Answers

(v.31-36)

We are gloriously sure of God's love because there is no condemnation.

We will have an ever greater experience of the \underline{surety} and $\underline{reality}$ of God's love in the midst of all the groaning circumstances outlined here.

In our Affirmations

(v.37-39)

We are gloriously sure of God's love because we more than c o n q u e r s.

Here is our conviction and our $\underline{c \circ n f i d e n c e}$ - we are more than conquerors - over sin, law and self.

Lessons for Living

Christians are to walk with God as sons.

We have been given the Holy Spirit to apply in our lives what Christ has done for us on the cross.

We must live by faith believing what God has said is true, even when it feels like or it seems like it is not true.

God is at work in every thing that is happening to His children to conform them to the image of Christ.

Though we may go through much suffering as we walk with God, God's love for us is eternal and unchanging. No suffering can actually separate us from God's love.

$Hardness\ of\ Heart$ Not tender towards God or people

Circumcise the foreskin of your heart and be no longer stubborn

Summary

Regular exposure to sin develops calluses over our hearts that inhibits a hearing and changing heart.

The Texts

Ezekiel 3:4-11 (ESV)

⁴ And he said to me, "Son of man, go to the house of Israel and speak with my words to them. ⁵ For you are not sent to a people of foreign speech and a hard language, but to the house of Israel— ⁶ not to many peoples of foreign speech and a hard language, whose words you cannot understand. Surely, if I sent you to such, they would listen to you. ⁷ But the house of Israel will not be willing to listen to you, for they are not willing to listen to me: because **all the house of Israel have a hard forehead and a stubborn heart.** ⁸ Behold, I have made your face as hard as their faces, and your forehead as hard as their foreheads. ⁹ Like emery harder than flint have I made your forehead. Fear them not, nor be dismayed at their looks, for they are a rebellious house." ¹⁰ Moreover, he said to me, "Son of man, all my words that I shall speak to you receive in your heart, and hear with your ears. ¹¹ And go to the exiles, to your people, and speak to them and say to them, 'Thus says the Lord God,' whether they hear or refuse to hear."

Zechariah 7:8-14 (ESV)

⁸ And the word of the Lord came to Zechariah, saying, ⁹ "Thus says the Lord of hosts, Render true judgments, show kindness and mercy to one another, ¹⁰ do not oppress the widow, the fatherless, the sojourner, or the poor, and let none of you devise evil against another in your heart." ¹¹ But they refused to pay attention and turned a stubborn shoulder and stopped their ears that they might not hear. ¹² **They made their hearts diamond-hard lest they should hear the law and the words that the Lord of hosts had sent by his Spirit through the former prophets.** Therefore great anger came from the Lord of hosts. ¹³ "As I called, and they would not hear, so they called, and I would not hear," says the Lord of hosts, ¹⁴ "and I scattered them with a whirlwind among all the nations that they had not known. Thus the land they left was desolate, so that no one went to and fro, and the pleasant land was made desolate."

Matthew 19:7-9 (ESV)

⁷ They said to him, "Why then did Moses command one to give a certificate of divorce and to send her away?" ⁸ He said to them, "Because of **your hardness of heart** Moses allowed you to divorce your wives, but from the beginning it was not so. ⁹ And I say to you: whoever divorces his wife, except for sexual immorality, and marries another, commits adultery."

Romans 2:1-5 (ESV)

¹ Therefore you have no excuse, O man, every one of you who judges. For in passing judgment on another you condemn yourself, because you, the judge, practice the very same things. ² We know that the judgment of God rightly falls on those who practice such things. ³ Do you suppose, O man—you who judge those who practice such things and yet do them yourself—that you will escape the judgment of God? ⁴ Or do you presume on the riches of his kindness and forbearance and patience, not knowing that God's kindness is meant to lead you to repentance? ⁵ But **because of your hard**

and impenitent heart you are storing up wrath for yourself on the day of wrath when God's righteous judgment will be revealed.

Ephesians 4:17–24 (ESV)

¹⁷ Now this I say and testify in the Lord, that you must no longer walk as the Gentiles do, in the futility of their minds. ¹⁸ They are darkened in their understanding, alienated from the life of God because of **the ignorance that is in them, due to their hardness of heart**. ¹⁹ They have become callous and have given themselves up to sensuality, greedy to practice every kind of impurity. ²⁰ But that is not the way you learned Christ!— ²¹ assuming that you have heard about him and were taught in him, as the truth is in Jesus, ²² to put off your old self, which belongs to your former manner of life and is corrupt through deceitful desires, ²³ and to be renewed in the spirit of your minds, ²⁴ and to put on the new self, created after the likeness of God in true righteousness and holiness.

Deuteronomy 10:12–18 (ESV)

¹² "And now, Israel, what does the Lord your God require of you, but to fear the Lord your God, to walk in all his ways, to love him, to serve the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul, ¹³ and to keep the commandments and statutes of the Lord, which I am commanding you today for your good? ¹⁴ Behold, to the Lord your God belong heaven and the heaven of heavens, the earth with all that is in it. ¹⁵ Yet the Lord set his heart in love on your fathers and chose their offspring after them, you above all peoples, as you are this day. ¹⁶ Circumcise therefore **the foreskin of your heart**, and **be no longer stubborn**. ¹⁷ For the Lord your God is God of gods and Lord of lords, the great, the mighty, and the awesome God, who is not partial and takes no bribe. ¹⁸ He executes justice for the fatherless and the widow, and loves the sojourner, giving him food and clothing.

Isaiah 46:12-13 (ESV)

¹² "Listen to me, you stubborn of heart, you who are far from righteousness: ¹³ I bring near my righteousness; it is not far off, and my salvation will not delay; I will put salvation in Zion, for Israel my glory."

Jeremiah 5:22-25 (ESV)

²² Do you not fear me? declares the Lord. Do you not tremble before me? I placed the sand as the boundary for the sea, a perpetual barrier that it cannot pass; though the waves toss, they cannot prevail; though they roar, they cannot pass over it. ²³ But this people has **a stubborn and rebellious heart**; they have turned aside and gone away. ²⁴ They do not say in their hearts, 'Let us fear the Lord our God, who gives the rain in its season, the autumn rain and the spring rain, and keeps for us the weeks appointed for the harvest.' ²⁵ Your iniquities have turned these away, and your sins have kept good from you.

¹² Who is the man so wise that he can understand this? To whom has the mouth of the Lord spoken, that he may declare it? Why is the land ruined and laid waste like a wilderness, so that no one passes through? ¹³ And the Lord says: "Because they have forsaken my law that I set before them, and **have not obeyed my voice or walked in accord with it**, ¹⁴ but have **stubbornly followed their own hearts** and have gone after the Baals, as their fathers taught them. ¹⁵ Therefore thus says the Lord of hosts, the God of Israel: Behold, I will feed this people with bitter food, and give them poisonous water to drink. ¹⁶ I will scatter them among the nations whom neither they nor their fathers have known, and I will send the sword after them, until I have consumed them."

Jeremiah 11:6-8 (ESV)

⁶ And the Lord said to me, "Proclaim all these words in the cities of Judah and in the streets of Jerusalem: Hear the words of this covenant and do them. ⁷ For I solemnly warned your fathers when I brought them up out of the land of Egypt, warning them persistently, even to this day, saying, Obey my voice. ⁸ Yet they did not obey or incline their ear, but **everyone walked in the stubbornness of his evil heart**. Therefore I brought upon them all the words of this covenant, which I commanded them to do, but they did not."

Mark 3:1-6 (ESV)

¹ Again he entered the synagogue, and a man was there with a withered hand. ² And they watched Jesus, to see whether he would heal him on the Sabbath, so that they might accuse him. ³ And he said to the man with the withered hand, "Come here." ⁴ And he said to them, "Is it lawful on the Sabbath to do good or to do harm, to save life or to kill?" But they were silent. ⁵ And he looked around at them with anger, grieved at their hardness of heart, and said to the man, "Stretch out your hand." He stretched it out, and his hand was restored. ⁶ The Pharisees went out and immediately held counsel with the Herodians against him, how to destroy him.

Mark 16:14-18 (ESV)

¹⁴ Afterward he appeared to the eleven themselves as they were reclining at table, and **he rebuked them for their unbelief and hardness of heart, because they had not believed those who saw him after he had risen.** ¹⁵ And he said to them, "Go into all the world and proclaim the gospel to the whole creation. ¹⁶ Whoever believes and is baptized will be saved, but whoever does not believe will be condemned.

2 Chronicles 34:26-28 (ESV)

²⁶ But to the king of Judah, who sent you to inquire of the Lord, thus shall you say to him, Thus says the Lord, the God of Israel: Regarding the words that you have heard, ²⁷ because **your heart was tender and you humbled yourself before God when you heard his words** against this place and its inhabitants, and you have humbled yourself before me and have torn your clothes and wept before me, I also have heard you, declares the Lord. ²⁸ Behold, I will gather you to your fathers, and you shall be gathered to your grave in peace, and your eyes shall not see all the disaster that I will bring upon this place and its inhabitants.'" And they brought back word to the king.

1 Peter 3:8-9 (ESV)

⁸ Finally, all of you, have unity of mind, sympathy, brotherly love, *a tender heart*, and a humble mind. ⁹ Do not repay evil for evil or reviling for reviling, but on the contrary, bless, for to this you were called, that you may obtain a blessing.

Lessons:

Series Summary

- All people live out of their hearts, their inner person.
- The heart's primary functions are believing and desiring with vulnerabilities to lies and lusts.
- God is bringing about situations to give us opportunities to obey Him from the heart.
- God is using situations to expose what is in our hearts through our actions and emotions.
- Because we are born sinners, our hearts are deceitful and difficult to penetrate. But God has provided His Word and Spirit to discern them.
- When we were converted, our hearts were circumcised by the Spirit, cut away from the flesh.
- When we were converted, we were placed into the death ad resurrection of Christ, so that sin through the flesh no longer controls us.
- Though we have been raised with Christ spiritually, we still live in our earthly bodies of flesh and in the fallen world of the flesh. Through the flesh, our hearts to tempted to sin.
- We must live by faith that what God tells us and what God promises us is true.
- Because sin is not our master, we must not yield our bodies to sin so that it does master us but rather yield our bodies to God who is our master.
- We must not resort to living by the Law which is weakened by the flesh and sin so that it cannot produce obedience.
- We must walk in the Spirit, set our minds on the things of God so that we do not walk in the flesh and set our minds of the things of this world.
- Having been justified by God, we walk with God in a relationship as His sons seeking to please Him in all ways.

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
